ADMAT news.



They died to keep us safe and free. We have talked about it in assembly and in class and

WE MUST REMEMBER THEM. So at 11o'clock on the 11th day of the 11th month has become special and important to us all. Year 6 designed and created very poignant pictures to display around the school and this time the whole school wrote poems of remembrance after reading the very famous poem—In Flanders Fields, which was written by John McCrae, during World War One. The poems were very thought provoking and brought tears to many eyes. Some of these were read out after the two minutes silence.
