Unit summary Children learn about the risks, responsibilities and consequences of sharing inappropriate images including nude selfies. They discuss the reasons why people might post such selfies and offer advice to two children who are considering sharing nude selfies.	Unit summary Children learn that most popular networking sites have age restrictions which should be adhered to. They discuss the ways of reducing the risks of using social networking sites and go on to develop a personal memo to remind them how to minimise these risks.
