We didn't start this term and this year the way we had hoped but it is lovely to have all of the children back to school for the remainder of this term.

We are very proud of how well the children have returned to school and settled back into school life. You will see how much they are enjoying their learning over the next few pages. Pupil engagement was good during remote (blended) learning and this has certainly supported the children with their learning and continuing their learning journey.

I would like to thank you for your continued support with all of the continued procedures and routines. This will still be in place after the Easter holidays and we will continue to review them in line with the latest Government guidance. We wish you all a relaxing Easter break.

Here is a reminder of the contact tracing for over the Easter holidays: For the purposes of contact tracing, parents and carers need only inform the education setting of a positive case if the symptoms develop within 2 days of being in their education setting. If symptoms develop after 2 days, they do not need to inform the setting.

Therefore, this would require you sending me a ClassDojo message to notify me. I will check this each day at 12pm and 4pm on Friday and Saturday (I will not need to be notified after this day). This facility is only to be used for this purpose.

Where pupils test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) during the holidays more than 2 days since being in an education setting, they will only need to inform their education setting if they will still be self-isolating when settings return. Parents and carers should follow contact tracing instructions provided by NHS Test and Trace.

Where pupils need to self-isolate due to contact with a positive case during the holidays, settings do not need to be informed about this until the first day of the Summer term.

For your reassurance, staff will continue to test twice a week at home throughout the Easter holidays. I am pleased to say that the vast majority of staff have received their first vaccination and more are due to have it by the end of this week.

School Improvement: our Recovery Curriculum

Before the new academic year, the teachers spent a lot of time refining our long term curriculum map to reflect the emphasis on the wider curriculum. All year groups (Year 1 to 6) will continue to focus on the same learning connection block at the same point but focus on a different concept. The aim of this is to make wider curriculum but to also build on the pupils' learning year upon year. For next term, the learning connection block is called, 'Discoveries'. Copies of the curriculum documents feature on the school website and the relevant ones shared via Microsoft Teams. The parent overview gives you a flavour of the learning taking place during the concept; the knowledge organiser which includes key facts the children need to know; and a homework menu for the children to carry out at home. Over the next few pages, look out for some of the excellent learning that the children have completed this half term.

As a result of school closures due to Covid-19, we planned a recovery curriculum and we have updated this again for when they returned in March to ensure children settle back into learning quickly and continue to make accelerated progress. It focuses on the children's learning but also their well-being. A full copy of this is on the school website.

We are trying to be an 'Eco friendly' school so we don't send home newsletters. Black and white copies are available in the foyer. It will also be available on the website under 'Newsletters' in the 'Parents' tab and will be posted on ClassDojo.

There is a river that flows upwards.


There is anti-matter.

As part of our recovery curriculum, we looked at this poem by Miroslav Holub. We then drew self portraits and opened them up to reveal what was inside our heads.










<u>Year 6</u>

As part of our English this term, Year 6 have been debating topical issues like: Should children wear school uniforms? Should mobile phones be allowed in school? Was Goldilocks a criminal?

The children have thoroughly enjoyed this topic and almost everyone has had ideas – for, or against, the topic being debated. 'Mr. Speaker' has always led the debate, demanded "Order in the Court" when necessary, summed up, asked the court to decide on the basis of what they had heard during the proceedings and announced the Guilty or Not guilty verdict, or the yes or no decision.

The children enjoy debating these issues but it is always interesting to hear their views when Miss Young suggests that the traditional tale of Goldilocks and the Three Bears can be viewed very differently if you think about the thoughts and reasons for each other's actions.







Also this term, as part of Year 6's DT and Computing lessons — (Computing to Program Topic) the children have enjoyed making felt badges to hold Micro:bits which will digitally display their names for when they are at college. After choosing the shape they liked and the colour of felt they wanted it was a tricky task to cut it out and cut the small holes necessary for the components of the microbits to be visible. Then came the even trickier task of learning how to thread a needle and sew around the shape to keep the microbit secure. Of course, some of the children could already sew (especially those who had gone to Mrs. Williams' sewing club!) and those children proved very helpful to their peers who were struggling. The finished product, after being programmed by the children themselves, will be something new and exciting.

Attendance Figures for March/April 2021

The class with the highest attendance each week, receives an extra playtime and the attendance trophy. If your child achieved 100% attendance for this term, they have received a badge for 100% as well as a bronze/silver badge — bronze for one term of 100% and silver for 2 terms. It has been pleasing to see that I have given out many of these today!

Each term they can earn a different colour attendance badge. And, for each term within the year, they can earn themselves an additional bronze, silver or gold badge.

End of Day Arrangements

Your child would have come home with an end of day arrangements form for you to fill in. We are asking for all parents to fill these in and return by the end of the first week after Easter (23rd April) to ensure all of our records are up to date. For safeguarding reasons, pupils will only be able to be picked up by those listed (unless notified by 2.30pm on the day by the parent). This also applies to those in Y4/5/6 walking home - they will only be able to walk home if permission has been given on the form.

Windmill Breakfast Club

Windmill Hill Academy has provision for before school opens in the form of a Breakfast Club. It has fully opened in line with the Covid-19 regulations for breakfast clubs.



If you are in need of childcare before the school day commences, why not book into the Breakfast Club where they can safely eat breakfast and play within their class bubbles

between the hours of 8am and 9am. They will be supervised by two qualified staff , Mrs Williams and Mrs Rutherford, for the duration of their stay before being escorted to their classrooms at the appropriate times.

There is a small charge for attending the club: £3.00 per session which includes breakfast of cereals, toast, fruit and juice or milk. If you are in receipt of Child's Tax Credits you may be able to claim the childcare costs back when filling in your annual award. Receipts can be arranged for this (please speak to Mrs Williams). Also, children who are in receipt of free school dinners or PPG, the cost is £2 per session.

Booking onto the club can be done online through the EDUSPOT app www.eduspot.co.uk whereby you can book the days you require and pay for them too. It's so easy! You will have to set up your information with a current email address and mobile number.
